November is known for many different things. It is voting month; the month we decide what to do with all that leftover Halloween candy; the month when Fall color slowly comes to an end, apple picking season winds down, and we begin see "The

Holidays" on the near horizon.

Perhaps the coziest thing for which November is known is that time when "all is safely gathered in." Nowadays we do not worry so much about making sure all the food crops and all the animals are safely gathered in for the winter, but it was not so long ago that such gathering in was of vital importance. It meant the difference between making it through the winter relatively comfortably and safely and perhaps not making it through the winter. The bountiful harvest gave rise to many meals before which grateful thanks was given to God.

Still, there is something haunting about that statement "all is safely gathered in." There is such warm assurance that all will be well in what may be a harsh and difficult winter. We all want, and need, to feel that warm assurance that all will be well with us and those we hold dear.

So what is the "all" for us that is safely gathered in this month? Perhaps it is family and close friends who went through tough times this past year but came through safely. Perhaps it is our own health, financial security, and home that are now all "safely gathered in."

But I wonder if it is something even deeper than that. I wonder if there is a sense in which we feel in calm, quiet moments that our spiritual life is at peace. There is often an inner turmoil when we wrestle with God, when we question God's presence in our life, even if God cares about what happens to us in this life. Such struggles of the soul are deeply troubling; if we cannot trust in God to care for us at that deepest level of our being, we cannot trust anyone or anything.

We all experience struggles of the soul from time to time. It has long been my belief and my experience that those times usually end with faith deepened and with the spirit dimension of our nature just a bit stronger. When we find ourselves at that endpoint of a spiritual struggle, we find without fail that God is, and has been, in the midst of that struggle ensuring that we come through with deeper faith and stronger spirit. There is a feeling at such moments that all is, indeed, safely gathered in.

More than anything else, November is the month during which we focus on giving thanks to God. We give faith-full thanks to God, thanks that is filled with the faith and love God has given us, not only for all we receive from God but more importantly for God's watchful care that sees us through the turbulence of life and blesses us with moments of peace and calm when all does, indeed, see safely gathered in.

May this Thanksgiving time be a blessing to this faith community, as we realize that once again, all is safely gathered in.

Deacon's Corner

It is hard to believe that we are beginning to see the end of another year...

But the reality of the changing weather and seasons is upon us and showing its splendor in many ways. Even here in our church, we have been exposed to a few extra blessings through worship, songs, and the members that make our church. The deacons have been busy in their own planning and support system for the church through prayer and concerns, and the many blessings that we are most thankful for, especially to our church family.

For those who are not sure what the Deacon's do, we have a very diverse list of responsibilities. A few of our activities include serving communion both in church, and to homebound individuals, providing meals to those in need while ill, or experiencing a hardship, sending cards for special occasions such as a wedding or birthday, illness, (or other noteworthy care receivers), and recognizing our youth in college or military status. In addition to these worthy causes, we also support the Peace of Bread ministry by submitting money each time our church serves a meal to those in our community who are in need of extra support. Likewise, we also provide food bags for Peace of Bread, so that they can be filled with groceries for the needy on the week before our turn to serve at Peace of Bread.

Other items that we tend to are providing rides for individuals needing rides to church or doctor appointments, provide Food baskets or gift cards to St. Patrick's Church for Easter, Thanksgiving and Christmas, and acknowledge our newborns by arranging an altar rose for each one, and providing a note in the bulletin, and plan, prepare and serve a meal to the congregation on the second Sunday in April.

If anyone has a need, they can come to any deacon for support, and we will be more than glad to support you as much as possible. We will welcome you with open arms, and will not turn anyone away who needs an extra support system. Even Christ himself provided us with a special message from his heavenly father (God) by sharing the beatitudes (or blessings) that He bestows on us. (You can find these in the Bible in Matthew 5: 1-12)


