



Our Purpose

The Mission Study Committee for the United Presbyterian Church of Whitinsville was elected by Session in late August of 2018. The committee consisted of 7 members with the Reverend Susan DeHoff as our interim pastor. The committee members are Harriet Platt, Noah Redden, Leslie Reichert, Judy Salzberg, Matthew Stone and Mark Widner, with Gaye Shannon serving as the chair.

We began meeting in September of 2018 on Tuesday evenings and continued into May of 2019. At each meeting, we opened in prayer and reflected on devotional readings and closed in prayer.

We held a Congregational Forum to kick off the study in late September. Our church had begun utilizing forum to notify the congregation of happenings in our church and give them opportunities to express concerns and joys. This forum was designed specifically to explain to the congregation what the Mission Study is, how we were to gather input from the congregation, and to give them a chance to ask questions. We also asked that the congregation keep the committee and study in prayer.

Additionally, we encouraged our congregation to consider joining one or more of our Bible studies. Our Sunday morning adult/high school class had just started studying Ephesians, our Saturday morning bible study was beginning the Book of Genesis, and Pastor Susan was leading two groups on Wednesday afternoons—one studying the book of Mark and one studying the book of John. We also have a sermon discussion group on Wednesday evenings, a men's prayer group on Friday mornings and the monthly meetings of our women's mission group.

In December, the Worship Committee sponsored a weekend of fasting and prayer. Our Mission Study was one of the focus topics of prayer for the weekend. All throughout the process we asked the congregation to keep the study in prayer. The Worship Committee held another time of fasting during Lent and again, our Mission Study was one of the focus topics.

As committee chair, I want to express my deepest thanks to the committee members for their hard work, support, prayer, and commitment to this committee and to our church. It has been a pleasure working with all of them and their input has been valued! God is going to do great things for our congregation. He has plans for us that we have not yet even dreamed about!

Our History

The United Presbyterian Church at Whitinsville was first organized in 1871, and then officially under the Boston Presbytery on December 30, 1874. After holding meetings and worship at various sites throughout the town, the church purchased the land at the corner of Cottage and Spring Streets in 1878. The first building was completed in 1882 and later

enlarged in 1895. That original building was torn down in 1914 to construct a larger one that would accommodate the voice of the Rev. Dr. Huston (our pastor from 1893 to 1935). This new building at Cottage and Spring Streets (which remains our church home to this day) was dedicated in March of 1915. In 1959 the church purchased an adjacent building on Spring Street to use as classrooms (now offices), and in 1988 the church kitchen was completely renovated. A handicap ramp was installed at the Spring Street entrance in 1992.



At what some members consider the height of our ministry,

United Presbyterian boasted a membership of around 300 worshippers. The back of the sanctuary was opened, as well as the balcony, to accommodate our many worshippers. We enjoyed four choirs, a large Sunday School and church stage productions.

While any congregation has no end of stories, achievements and legends to share, we pay particular interest to the last decade or so of our congregation's history.



In 2003, our church decided to host a "soup kitchen" to provide hot meals for our neighbors in need. Known as "Peace of Bread," one person took advantage of our free meal that first night. We currently serve up to 150 guests each Wednesday night, with the assistance of other area churches and organizations who have joined in our ministry. Additional services added over the years include a food pantry and a used clothing room.

In 2017, God called us to step out in faith and apply to become a Temporary Emergency Shelter to provide a warm place for the homeless in our town. We, along with two other churches in the Valley, have worked together to establish the Blackstone Valley Emergency Shelter. Our trustees have worked diligently

to create incredible space in our church for both Peace of Bread and the Shelter to work efficiently.

Two years ago, a group came together to create Friends of Peace of Bread, with the purpose of raising money to offset the expenses our church incurs to house the above ministries. This



past year Friends of Peace of Bread worked with the local Rotary to host a very successful Wine and Chocolate Tasting. The monies raised were donated to the annual giving fund. Our church choir also performed Jesus Christ Superstar and the proceeds from the last four years were donated to our varied outreach programs such as Peace of Bread, Friends of Peace of Bread and the Emergency Shelter



Another step recently taken was to start a worship service on Wednesday nights to reach out to those coming to Peace of

Bread, hoping they might find a comfortable place in which to worship God. Our Minister of Music donated his time to lead a contemporary service of music and prayer. After five years, we have decided to step back and pray about where God is leading us next.

We currently have 60 to 70 worshippers participating in our Sunday morning service and another 12 to 15 on Wednesday nights. We have four well-attended Bible studies throughout the week, and there are several active small groups, including our women's book club, an ac-



tive women's mission group known as Kaythern M. Huston Mission Circle, our Wednesday men's work group and our choir. A recent addition is our children's choir (started by a young couple from our church) that has brought us much joy.

Our Mission Study Process

(Including Bible Study Review)

We kicked off our congregational gatherings and small group discussions on November 4 immediately following our worship services when we shared a meal together and then shared our favorite memories. This proved to be a welcome event as members were randomly chosen to be put into small groups, and we learned so much from each other. We started by asking the small groups to discuss Deuteronomy 6:10-12 and reflect on not forgetting what God has done through this church, and what it means to their lives in our church. We then asked the groups to share their memories. Memories such as: children being baptized, Sunday school, mission trips, fellowship, praying for family and friends with cancer and other illnesses, to choir, camping trips, Bible studies, Peace of Bread and the emergency shelter and more abounded from all six groups.

Our second congregational gathering was on December 9, 2018. After worship and after sharing homemade soups and fellowshipping together, we divided into small groups to study Scripture and look at the gifts from God, based on the Scriptures and then determine some of the gifts that have manifested in our church. Again, we randomly divided into small groups and realized that our congregation has truly accepted God's calling with our gifts. All five



groups discussed the following Scriptures: Romans 12:3-13, Ephesians 4: 1-7 and 1st Corinthians 12:4-13. After discussion, each small group listed all of the many different gifts that have manifested into our church. Everyone listed gifts of hospitality, prophecy, service, teaching, giving, encouragement, leadership, healing, and serving.

In late November, we also conducted a congregational survey. We encouraged each and every member and frequent attendee to participate in this survey.

When the deadline passed, we were disappointed in the number of surveys that came back, so we did a push in January for more surveys to be completed. The push allowed us to increase by almost half the amount of surveys completed (59). The results were shared with the congregation at our congregational gathering held on March 10.

The committee had several meetings in between the survey and congregational gatherings and decided in January that we would not try to have independent small group discussions. We were getting great participation in our after church luncheons (if you feed them they will come), and therefore, decided to continue having the gatherings.

As we discussed in our committee, the memories, the way our church uses its gifts, and the results of the survey, we realized that we had been living out much of our church's vision statement that was created in 2004 which is:

We are a Christ centered, biblically based, spiritually growing church family. God is calling us to devoted prayer, inspiring worship, personal witness, diverse small groups, and vital Christian education. We commit ourselves to the development of our church family and the use of our gifts. We love the Lord and are empowered by the Holy Spirit to love each other and to reach out in Word and deed as disciples in the local and global community - all to the Glory of God.

We have also strived to follow our New Beginnings commitment of living Upward in Worship, Outward in Service and Onward in Faith.

We decided that we would hold our next congregational gathering in February to focus on the second sentence of our Vision Statement: God is calling us to devoted prayer, inspiring worship, personal witness, diverse small groups, and vital Christian education.

At the gathering, we once again enjoyed lunch together, reflected on scripture from Philippians 4:6-7 on prayer, Isaiah 25:1 on inspiring worship, Mark 16:15 on personal witness, Galatians 3: 26-29 on diverse small groups and the Great Commission, Matthew 28:19-20 for Christian education. Again we did this in our randomly chosen small groups to discuss the vision statement using these prompts: How are we responding to God's call to devoted prayer, inspiring worship, personal witness, diverse small groups, and vital Christian education and then to answer the question of "what we are doing well" and "what we needed to improve on."

When the committee met again in late February, we felt that we were making great progress and were satisfied with our gatherings. We learned that our members really enjoyed the small group discussions and feel that we should recommend to Session that this format is a great way to get everyone talking.

As mentioned above, our final congregational gathering was held in March where we shared the results of the survey and then again divided into small groups to discuss the results by asking the groups to give us their "take away" from the survey results. This proved to be valuable to our committee in preparation of our goals.

So in late March, the committee started working on the goals and objectives gathered from our congregational gatherings and small group discussions to complete our Mission Study Report. We had several meetings focused on writing these goals, (not an easy process). We solicited advice and help from Jane Wilson, our Committee on Ministry liaison, who was invited to come to a meeting. We appreciated very much her input to our process.

Once the goals were done, we started compiling the other pieces of our report in late May/early June.

Summary of our Survey

The Survey was conducted December 2018 - January 2019. A total of 59 paper surveys were collected and analyzed. The survey was divided into seven sections of mixed question types, including Likert scale, ranking, and open-ended questions. The results of the survey were first shared with the Mission Study Committee on February 26, 2019 and then with the broader congregation on March 10, 2019. The following is a summary of the most salient points gleaned from each section of the survey:

CHURCH PARTICIPATION

The majority of survey respondents have been members of our congregation for 20 or more years. Most respondents live within a 15 minute drive to the church, attend church at least 2-3 times per month and consider religion very important in their lives. Respondents frequently pray and read the Bible, but fairly infrequently spend time seeking new members for the congregation.

A quarter of the respondents do not participate in any church committees or groups. Participation in the congregation over the last few years has remained the same or slightly increased for most respondents. For those for whom participation has increased, the majority indicated it is because they have accepted additional responsibilities. For those for whom participation has decreased, respondents indicated health problems, less time available, and a more negative attitude toward church as the reasons.

TASKS OF THE CHURCH

Respondents were most satisfied with the congregations' emphasis on adult Christian education, engaging in acts of charity and providing fellowship opportunities. Correspondingly, respondents felt like the strongest tasks of the congregation are engaging in acts of charity and providing adult religious education. Respondents reported being least satisfied with the congregations' emphasis on children's Christian education, sharing the good news of the gospel, and encouraging member action on social, political and economic issues. Respondents indicated the task most in need of strengthening was helping members deepen their relationship with God. Written comments in this section indicated a desire to focus more on attracting families with young children and developing stronger programming in order to attract families and build membership.

ORGANIZATIONAL CHARACTERISTICS

Respondents agreed most strongly that members help each other, there are equal opportunities for leadership, activities of committees are disseminated, and most major decisions are openly discussed. Respondents most strongly disagreed that our congregation has an effective member recruitment strategy, there is excitement about the future, there is adequate training for lay leadership and that disagreements among members are dealt with openly.

CONGREGATIONAL IDENTITY

Respondents feel our church is more influenced by history and tradition than contemporary ideas and that our church is very involved with the community. Our church is not considered one of the status churches in the area. Our church maintains an educational approach to social issues versus action-oriented and that our congregation emphasizes education and gradual growth in faith versus a born-again orientation. Finally, respondents indicated that our congregation gives fairly strong expression to denominational identity.

SIZE AND CONDITION OF FACILITIES

Respondents indicated overall satisfaction with the size and appeal of the sanctuary and the grounds, but there is dissatisfaction with the size and appeal of our educational and fellowship space. There were a number of comments related to parking. Parking is currently adequate, but without the spaces afforded by Unibank, parking would be a much larger challenge.

ADULT EDUCATION AND FELLOWSHIP PROGRAMS

Respondents indicated that Sunday mornings are by far the best times for adult education and fellowship. The least favorable times for education and fellowship were indicated to be weekday mornings, a weekend retreat, and weekday afternoons.

TASKS OF THE PASTOR

Respondents indicated the most important priorities for the pastor should be leading sensitive worship, the spiritual development of members, visiting the sick, shut-in and bereaved and involving laity in planning. The lowest priorities for the pastor according to respondents were holding social justice issues before the congregation, regional and national denominational participation, visiting members at home, and supporting the world mission of the church.

Objectives

• Hire a Pastor who will walk with us as we live out our Church Vision Statement, focusing on the second sentence, which is:

God is calling us to devoted prayer, inspiring worship, personal witness, diverse small groups and vital Christian education."

• Work with our new Pastor to learn how to increase our efforts to reach out to our community, with the goal of bringing others into a relationship with Jesus Christ.

GOAL 2

Continue to broaden and deepen our **PRAYER LIFE**

Objectives

- Increase the number of prayer services for the overall congregation (Examples: Fasting, Healing, Commissioning services, as well as prayer times for and with the community.)
- Deepen our prayer lives by teaching different ways to pray.
- Provide daily prayer guides

GOAL 3

Encounter God in our WORSHIP

Objectives

- Increase the variety and quantity of music in our worship service. (Examples: Add musical choral responses, choral benedictions and more.)
- Maintain a blend in worship style by including contemporary, gospel and traditional elements in a way that glorifies God and feeds everyone. (Examples: Include contemporary songs and traditional hymns, dynamic preaching, have more fluidity in the content of the Sunday Service.)
- Share the love of God in our worship services with others in the community by inviting them, witnessing to them and fellowshipping with them.

GOAL 4

Enable and Support <u>PERSONAL WITNESS</u> opportunities.

Objectives

- With our new pastor's leading, explore how we can inspire our members to reach out to the community and invite others to join us in worship.
- Offer opportunities to share testimonies in worship. (Example: the "word on stars" (a word given for a year; then sharing your experience with the word)
- Grow members to be disciples in Christ, become more comfortable in sharing their faith testimony so they can reach out to others in the community and at their work place.

GOAL 5

Provide community-building **DIVERSE SMALL GROUPS**

Objectives

- Identify similar interests and create small groups that would attract members as well as the unchurched.
- Train small group leaders.
- Provide group leaders with encouragement and accountability.
- Develop opportunities for focused small groups where we could invite others. (Examples: Women's Retreats, Promise Keepers, Concerts, Youth Retreats, etc.)

GOAL 6

Continue and expand VITAL CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

Objectives

- Strengthen the attendance of members at our current Bible studies (children, youth & adult) and invite people from the outside to join us.
- Increase the options for new Bible studies by identifing, assessing, and training more Bible study teachers.
- Work with leaders to develop programs for youth & children from our church and the surrounding community..


GOAL 7

GROUP 1

Gifts Mentioned:

Cheerful, mercy, giving, congregation, hospitality, prophecy, serving, teaching, encouragement, contributing, giving, leadership

How Manifested:

- Hospitality: welcoming concerns, very giving, many years with NAC (Northbridge Association of Churches) and POB (Peace of Bread.)
- Prophecy: visions from members the children's choir, POB, Shelter
- Service: too many to tell
- Teaching: Pastors, Elders, Sunday School, Aging with Grace Bible Study, Youth Group
- Giving: thrift store, NAC (Northbridge Association of Churches), Christmas & Easter baskets and so on and so on

GROUP 2

Gifts Mentioned:

Wisdom, knowledge, faith, healing, miraculous powers, speaking in tongues/interpretation, prophecy, serving, teaching, encouraging, contributing, leadership, mercy, zeal/love, hospitality, joy, patience,

How Manifested:

- We have a Pastor
- Encouraging/Contributing; Peace of Bread
- Teaching: Bible studies, small groups, Prime Time (After-school program for kids from ages 5—12), Children's Church
- Leadership; Worship leader, session
- Serving: Deacons, Care, Trustees Volunteers
- Hospitality: Greeters, Mission Study Luncheons
- Healing/Encouraging/Contributing: those who share kind words, volunteer and spread cheer

- Comforting/caring/mercy: concerns built into the service
- Use people's gifts as needs/ideas arise
- Church is like a stage, where we are willing to encourage members to use their gifts; being a vehicle to use those gifts
- Being a church "of" the community instead of one "in" the community
- Adapting to talents and making use of the current members
- Known in the community as being welcoming
- Diversity, our disagreements allow gifts to shine
- What happens if this church just disappeared? (Litmus test)

Congregational Gathering February 10 summary of responses to Mission Statement

How are we responding to God's call to devoted prayer?

- **Group 1:** Prayer chain, Friday am men's group, Session monthly prayer mtg, all committee meetings open and close in prayer, focused prayer time during church service,
- **Group 2:** Bible study, prayer chain, encouragement, shut ins, prayers of the people, weekly scoop, PoB Bible study, Session prayer meeting
- Group 3: Session prayer once a month, corporate prayer Sunday and Wed, open with prayer at committee meetings, KMHMC (Kathryn M Huston Mission Circle), prayer time during meetings, prayer chain
- **Group 4**: Utilizing prayer chain, prayers of joys and concerns during worship service, weekly scoop lists of prayers, reaching out to those on the prayer lists
- **Group 5**: Session prayer meeting, email prayer chain, prayers/concerns in the Scoop and church, we spread the Word, Deacons urgent prayer requests, start and end committee meetings in prayer, we have a pattern of praying
- Group 6: As a church we pray together during the services and meetings

What are we doing well?

- Group 1: Leadership praying through the church, meeting individual needs, communicate prayer needs by bulletin, newsletter, email, good follow up more of that is good, know outcomes,
- Group 2: Lots of choices of times to pray with different times throughout the week
- Group 3: Session prayer, joys and concerns, scoop, prayer chain
- Group 4: Reaching out to those in need by offering rides, providing meals, cards, and gifts, etc.
- Group 5: Outreaching to others and spreading the word/need to pray, do well with intercessory prayer
- **Group 6**: We have done fasting and prayer programs, pray at the PoB, active prayer chain and elders pray for others and our church once a month.

- **Group 1:** More after church prayers as a service maybe annually, involve the community by having concerts of prayer with common ideas concerning town, state or nation, meeting individual needs, teaching how to pray with lessons or in a small group,
- **Group 2:** More as a congregation, congregational prayer service, retreat off site, learning different types/kinds of prayer, written down, drawing, painting.



Town of Northbridge is composed of several villages Linwood, Northbridge, Riverdale, Rockdale and Whitinsville

Area Used for Demographic Study: Northbridge is a growing suburban town made up of several villages, including Linwood, Northbridge, Riverdale, Rockdale and Whitinsville. It is located in the Blackstone River Valley of southcentral Massachusetts. The area played a major role in early American industrial development, due to its natural resources and strategic location to Worcester and Providence.


This suburban community has a rich manufacturing heritage centered around the textile industry. Many of the textile mills along the river have now been converted into other businesses or residential living centers, with much of the original architecture retained throughout the town.

The area is demographically influenced by the large numbers of immigrants from the Netherlands, Canada and Armenia who were brought in to provide labor in the mills, and many of the single-family houses in the area were originally "shop homes" built by the mills for their workers to live in. Whitinsville and the Whitin family's industrial operations continued to dominate Northbridge in the Late Industrial Period (1870-1915). By the beginning of the 20th century,

Northbridge was a thoroughly industrial town with parts of it densely populated, where 78% of the men were employed in the factories.

The Whitin family's factories continued to prosper until a depression hit the textile industry in 1923. This economic downturn forced the closure of cotton mills throughout the region, including the Whitinsville Cotton Company, the Linwood Cotton Company, and mills in Rockdale and Riverdale. The Whitin Machine Works put most of the buildings to use for some part of their continuing operation, and carried the business through to a brief spike in activity during World War II, when the company manufactured magnetos for American aircraft. In the 1960's the Whitin family sold their business interests in Northbridge and today Northbridge is no longer a company town, but memories of that long era remain.






Percent of households - poverty




Population breakdown by ethnicity
